The presenters will draw legal connections between the crime victim movement and the criminal justice response to sexual assault.

10:30 AM-12:00 PM BREAK OUT SESSIONS

Using the tracks as a guideline, attendees are encouraged to design their own curriculum based on individual practice, background and familiarity with victim law.

» Sexual Assault Track: "Panel: Sexual Assault Research"

A panel discussion on the latest legal developments in the area of sexual violence, including polygraphing rape victims, media privacy, the PROTECT Act, and the inter-section of international human rights law and violence against women.

» Practical Skills Track: "Representing Victims at Trial"

Presenter: Keli Luther, J.D.

The Victims Legal Assistance Project at Arizona State University provides pro bono advice and assistance to crime victims and regularly represents victims in criminal trial courts. The session provides strategies for working with victims of all types of crime.

» Victim Law Track: "Extending Victims Rights to Juvenile Proceedings"

Presenter: Kim Montagriff, J.D.

Is there a "crime" victim in juvenile proceedings? What are a victims' rights in these proceedings? Juvenile proceedings are a unique hybrid of a criminal proceeding and a civil adjudication; this session addresses what role victims' rights can and should play in this context.

12:30-1:00 PM KEYNOTE SPEAKER: STEVE TWIST, J.D. Founder, Arizona Voice for Crime Victims

Mr. Twist will discuss pending federal legislation that would provide strong victims' rights for federal crime victims and promises to powerfully invigorate legal advocacy in the criminal process for victims of crime. The legislation passed the Senate and is currently awaiting action in the House.

1:15-2:45 PM BREAK OUT SESSIONS

» Sexual Assault Track: "Sexual Assault and the Military"

Presenter: Christine Hanson

Ms. Hanson heads The Miles Foundation, a private, non-profit organization providing services to victims of violence associated with the military. The session focuses on the unique challenges faced by military victims and civilians raped by military personnel.

» Practical Skills Track: "Introduction to Victims' Rights"

Presenter: Joanna Tucker Davis, J.D.

Many state constitutions afford victims broad constitutional rights such as fairness, respect, dignity, privacy, due process and freedom from abuse. These rights will be discussed in depth and victims' specific state constitutional rights will be surveyed.

» Victim Law Track: "Plea and Sentencing"

Presenters: Russell Butler J.D., Meg Garvin, J.D.

The focus of this session will be victims' rights in the plea bargaining and sentencing processes and potential remedies for violation of those rights.

» Sexual Assault Track: "Panel: Comprehensive Legal Needs for Sexual Assault Survivors"

The presenters will provide an overview of how sexual assault survivors may respond to criminal and civil prosecutions and will then provide a detailed consideration of the full range of sexual assault survivors' legal needs and possible remedies.

» Practical Skills Track: "Working with State Attorneys General on Victim Appeals"

Presenters: Marian Decker, J.D., Liani Jean Heh Reeves, J.D.

The session addresses how crime victim lawyers and state Attorney General offices can partner to enforce crime victims' rights in criminal appeals.

» Victim Law Track: "Challenging the Prosecutor's Decision Not to Charge"

Presenter: Steve Twist, J.D.

A prosecutor's decision not to charge denies the crime victim an opportunity for justice. Methods for challenging this decision and obstacles to prosecution once criminal charges are entered will be discussed.

» Sexual Assault Track: "Pro Bono Recruitment"

Presenters: Catherine Carroll, J.D., MaryLee Perry, J.D.

An interactive discussion on effective ways to recruit, train, and retain pro bono attorneys to represent sexual assault survivors in rural, mixed and urban communities.

» Practical Skills Track: "Writs and Review"

Presenter: Meg Garvin, J.D.

This is the first of a two-part series. Part One is an examination of the use of writs of certiorari, mandamus and prohibition as methods of enforcing victims' rights. Part Two, "Appeal & Review," immediately follows this session.

» Victim Law Track: "Sexual Assault for Crime Victim Attorneys"

Presenter: Daniela Letz, MSW

Lead by an experienced rape crisis center advocate, this workshop provides an overview of what crime victim rights attorneys need to know about working with sexual assault survivors, how survivors differ from other victims of crime, and ways in which the experience of being sexually assaulted may affect a victim's ability to pursue criminal and civil legal remedies.

» Sexual Assault Track: "Prison Rape"

The session provides an overview of sexual assault in men's and women's correctional institutions, including incidents of sexual assault, facility and government liability, and prisoner access to rape counseling, medical care, and other assault-related services.

» Practical Skills Track: "Appeal and Review"

Presenter: Doug Beloof, J.D.

This is the second part of a two-part series. The use of interlocutory appeal, victim direct appeal of rights violations, and unlawful breaches of confidentiality will be the focus of this session. Part One, "Writs and Review," immediately precedes this session.

» Victim Law Track: "Legislative Trends"

Presenter: Sarah Brown, J.D.

The focus of this session will be legislative trends in crime victim and sexual assault law.

Presenter: Robert Quan

The session will cover how an organization can collect, track and manage various measures (performance, quality, services delivered, etc.) required to obtain funding and how to blend methodologies with web-based technology as a means to gather, process and distribute information. Also covered are information processing techniques as a means to comply with reporting requirements. Privacy and security concerns will be addressed. This is a highly interactive presentation where audience participation is encouraged.
